Rose Nakamura, Co-Founder and Executive Director of Project Dana, passed away on July 10th, a day shy of her 92nd birthday. Rose was a visionary leader with a big heart, building the interfaith volunteer caregiver program into a vital resource to over 1200 kupuna through a network of 32 churches statewide. On November 8, 2018, HPGS honored Rose at its 2nd annual fundraiser dinner at Kahala Nui. The room was filled with

attendees who came to honor Rose's tremendous accomplishments. In true form during the dinner, Rose asked Cyndi Osajima, current Executive Director, to pass around a basket to collect more cash donations to support scholarships, which drew smiles and chuckles from attendees. All proceeds from the dinner went to HPGS undergraduate and graduate scholarships, a fitting legacy for a leader who inspired so many student interns and young volunteers over the years. Her leadership, warmth, and selfless giving will be forever missed.


