HAWAII SHIP NEWS

Hawaii SHIP said that the Medicare open enrollment period runs from October 15 to December 7, 2023. During this time, people on Medicare can compare 2024 coverage options on Medicare.gov, which provides clear, easy-to-use information to allow people to compare options for health and drug coverage, which may change from year to year. People who want to keep their current Medicare coverage do not need to re-enroll. HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS FOR SENIORS

Consider these tips before the festivities begin to ensure your loved ones are safe and comfortable this Halloween.

1. Avoid the roads.

A general rule is to avoid excessive driving on Halloween night. With a large number of children and their families crowding the streets and going door to door for candy, there is a much bigger risk of pedestrian accidents. If possible, do all errands and visits before the evening begins. Popular trick-or-treat hours are from 5:30pm to 9:30pm, so plan to be off the roads during this time.

2. Remove Hazards.

Candles and pumpkins are beautiful decorations to add to the stairs or porch, but consider moving items that could pose a tripping hazard to higher levels. If your family chooses to light candles as additional decoration, make sure that it is not placed where it can easily be blown over by the wind or knocked over.

3. Recruit A Team.

If your loved one is worried about handling Halloween alone, suggest a few family members, friends, or neighbors drop by to help provide company throughout the evening. Bringing over some food and companionship can put your family at ease and can help lessen the stress of Halloween.

The federal Older Americans Act established an Aging Network and provides federal funding for elderly support services, nutrition services, preventive health services, elder rights protection, and family caregiver support services. Chapter 349 of the Hawaii Revised statutes established the Executive Office on Aging as the focal point for all matters relating to older adults' needs and the coordination and development of caregiver support services within the state of Hawaii.

- 1. Keep your vaccinations current and up-to-date. As an example, are you current on your Flu and COVID vaccines? Fall is the time to prepare for Flu season. Older individuals are more vulnerable to the Flu and COVID. So keep your vaccinations up-to-date.
- 2. Do exercises that promote leg strength and balance. Poor leg strength and balance are a common cause of falls in older adults. If you seem low on strength or have poor balance talk to your doctor.
- 3. Walk more. Walking can be an easy way for older adults to stay active. It's also a form of exercise that can easily be combined with socializing. Walk with a friend, or walk to visit a friend.
- 4. Wash your hands frequently. Sanitize surfaces regularly. Consider wearing a mask when with large groups in confined spaces. This is especially important as we gather for holiday festivities.
- Socialize Safely! Contribute and engage. Research has shown that relationships and contributing to the world are key to maintaining wellbeing while aging. Take advantage of outdoor spaces and engage with others.

Knowing the journey a person has traveled to get to this point in life is admirable. The Hawaii Pacific Gerontological Society is honoring **Gary Simon** for his many years of being an advocate for Hawaii's Kupuna.

Born in Honolulu, Gary is a proud graduate of the 1978 class at Saint Louis High School. He received his bachelor of science in chemistry from the University of Hawai'i Manoa and says he learned how to reason and how to think rationally, as well as sensibly. More significantly, the degree taught Gary how to think freely and to consider and try different avenues and method to realize a desired outcome or solution.

Before retiring in 2019, Gary was the Director of Corporate Affairs and Advocacy at the St. Francis Healthcare System, was previously Executive Director of St. Francis Hospice and Program Director for St. Francis Health

Services for Senior Citizens. As a volunteer, he serves on the boards of The Arc In Hawaii, the Hawaii Family Caregiver Coalition, and Kokua Council. Gary served multiple terms on the State of Hawaii Policy Advisory Board for Elder Affairs and was a member of the Statewide Task Force on Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias.
