What an eventful day we had last week when a magnitude 8.8 earthquake occurred off the Kamchatka Peninsula of Russia. It was reported to be one of the most powerful quakes ever recorded. When my phone went off with the potential tsunami disaster alert, my mind went to those unbelievable scenes of destruction when a tsunami struck Fukushima in Japan, wiping out boats, cars, buses, homes and everything else in its path. I am sure I was not alone in remembering that terrible footage.

CONFERENCE KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



This year's biennial conference is pleased to announce THREE keynote speakers, two on Thursday, September 11th and one on Friday, September 12th. The morning keynote for Thursday will be **Sandy Markwood**, CEO of USAging, who is a national advocate for aging issues and a champion not only for ensuring that older adults have the best supports to age well at home and in their communities, but for ensuring that our society values and supports

people across the lifespan. A passionate advocate, Sandy has led numerous USAging campaigns to support the needs of older adults as they age, including those focused on combating social isolation among older adults, encouraging healthy aging, supporting caregivers, promoting livable communities, and access to transportation and housing options.



Lt Governor **Sylvia Luke** will be speaking during Thursday's lunch hour. She is the 16th Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawaii, the third woman to hold the office, and the highest-ranking Korean-American official in the U.S. Born in Seoul, South Korea, she immigrated to Honolulu at the age of nine with her family. Sylvia learned to speak English with the help of there 5th-grade teacher at Queen Ka`ahumanu Elementary. She later graduated

from Roosevelt High School and the University of Hawaii at Manoa. Following her undergraduate degree, she continued her education at the University of San Francisco. Sylvia was first elected to the Hawaii State Legislature in 1998, where she served until 2022.



AARP is sponsoring the keynote speaker for Friday morning. His name is **Duke Han**, PhD, a Diplomate of the American Board of Professional Psychology in Clinical Neuropsychology, a Fellow of the American Psychological Association and the National Academy of Neuropsychology, and a tenured Professor of Psychology, Family Medicine, Neurology, and Gerontology at the University of Souther California. The title of his speech is "Financial Decision Making in

Older Age: Relevance to Alzheimer's Disease and What You Can Do About It."

WAYS TO SAVE - AARP'S 2025 EDITION

Many HPGS members might be AARP members, as is Sherry Goya, HPGS Executive Director, who receives their bulletins and magazines. The AARP July/August Bulletin had a list of **90 Great Ways to Save** and she wanted to share just a few of them. Listed as #1 (which Sherry tries to do most times) is **Use self-checkout**. Self-checkout can lead to a decrease in impulse purchases, in large part because shoppers are paying attention to what they're buying and how much things cost when they're scanning items. #8. **Try store brands**. You can save 30 to 50 percent off the cost of name brands. Check the ingredients in the store brand's product against the ones in your favorite name brand. You may be able to return an item if not satisfied. #33 **Hit your warehouse clubs midday**. Warehouse stores like Sam's Club and Costco typically run "product demonstrations," a.k.a. free samples, often between 11am and 5pm most days
